MURDER IN OUR NEIGHBORHOOD

On Saturday, May 7, in broad daylight, and directly across the street from where visitors were assembling for a house tour at Whitley Heights, a man was murdered.

The fatal stabbing occurred at noon in front of the apartment building at the northwest corner of Highland and Camrose. It happened after the suspect, Donald Russell Hamilton, had already thrown rocks at a passing automobile and at a school bus, breaking the bus door window and showering glass over the driver.

police According to official reports, the victim, Gregg Rab, 23, was stabbed to death after Hamilton shouted remarks at him. The same remarks were shouted by Hamilton at the automobile and the bus.

Hamilton, 39, told police he had been living in his car and had been sitting on the steps of the apartment building before he saw Rab. He admitted the stabbing with a hunting knife which was later found in bushes near the building. Deputy District Attorney Laurence N. Wolfe, who is also a member of the HHA board, filed murder charges against Hamilton.

Considering the influx of prostitutes on Highland Avenue, we wonder why police cars are not cruising the area. And if police cars were cruising, perhaps they would have seen the two rock throwing incidents and prevented the murder that followed. One witness to the rock throwing found police on Hollywood Boulevard, but by the time they came to the site, the victim had been stabbed and the suspect was in custody.

IS RTD LISTENING?

Despite long-standing opposition from all of those who live in the Hollywood Bowl area, the RTD board voted May 12 to add a Hollywood Bowl station to the proposed Metro Rail Subway. The following letter was sent May 14 to the RTD Board, Mayor Bradley, Councilwoman Stevenson, members of the Board of Supervisors.

As of this publication, not one of those to whom the letter was mailed has sent a response. We have put them on notice. We plan to pursue and win this protest.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

As the residents who live closest to the Hollywood Bowl, we, more than any other Los Angelenos, are aware of not only the Bowl's cultural contributions, but also of the traffic and congestion and other problems with which we cope every season. CULTURE is advanced as the key word here. Make no mistake, ladies and gentlemen, the real key word is MONEY. R.T.D. METRO will be one of the biggest developers in the history of Los Angeles. The Los Angeles Philharmonic leases Hollywood Bowl from Los Angeles County, and the two share all parking revenue. If Hollywood Bowl becomes a huge Park-and-Ride Center at the expense of the surrounding community, the County and the Philharmonic will have earned a disreputable profit.

Because of our knowledge, we have been on the record as opposed to a Hollywood Bowl station for the proposed Metro Rail subway, and we are outraged by the 6-3 vote taken May 12 in which you voted for such a station.

According to the story May 13 in the L. A. TIMES, those in favor argued that:

- 1. The Bowl is one of the City's cultural centers. BUT THE PROPONENTS FAILED TO CONSIDER THE FACT THAT THE BOWL SERVES AS SUCH A CENTER FOR ONLY 11 WEEKS OF THE YEAR (July 4 -Sept 17, 1983), AND DURING THE REMAINING 41 WEEKS OFFERS NOTHING TO ATTRACT TRAIN LOADS OF VISITORS.
- 2. The stop would make the Bowl more accessible. BUT THE PROPONENTS FAILED TO CONSIDER THE FACT THAT THE BOWL IS SERVED BY MANY PUBLIC BUS LINES, AND SCORES OF LOW-PRICED CHARTER BUSES BRING THOUSANDS OF OTHERS TO THE BOWL DURING THE TWO MONTHS IT IS OFFERING ENTERTAINMENT, AND FROM AREAS THE SUBWAY WILL NOT BE ACCESSIBLE TO.

Why then do you want to increase the cost of the subway system by adding a station which serves no purpose for nearly ten months of the year?

We need a subway system. We do not need to have it jeopardized by such irrational planning. We believe you owe us an explanation, from the six board members who have decided to ignore the taxpayers most directly involved with the Bowl and its activities.

We await a reply.
