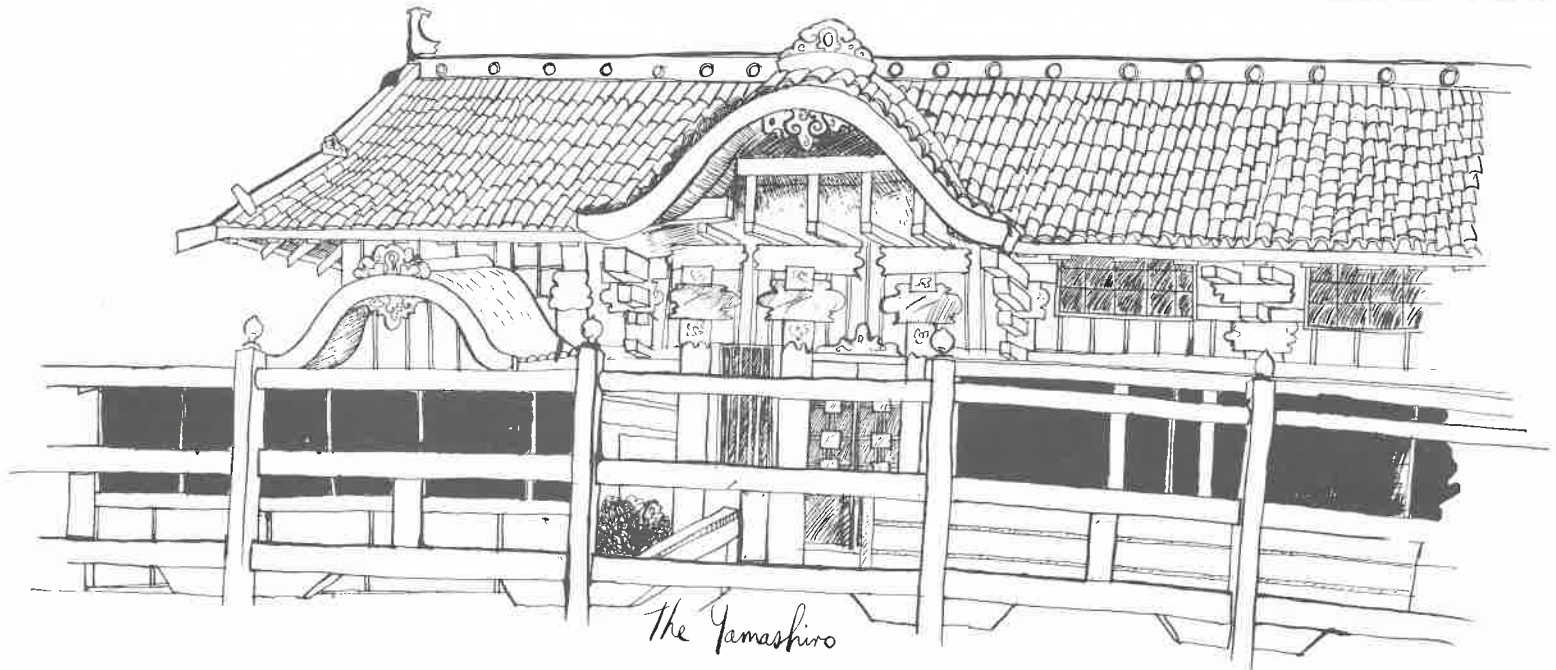

Time: Social hour, 7 P.M. Business, 8 P.M.

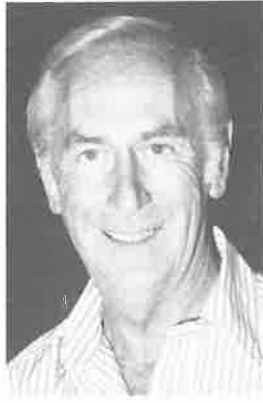

A native of Ohio, Herb attended Ohio University and took his first job as a reporter for the Cleveland Plain Dealer. He made his first journey to California as a young man and attended UCLA. HOW TO JOIN HHA

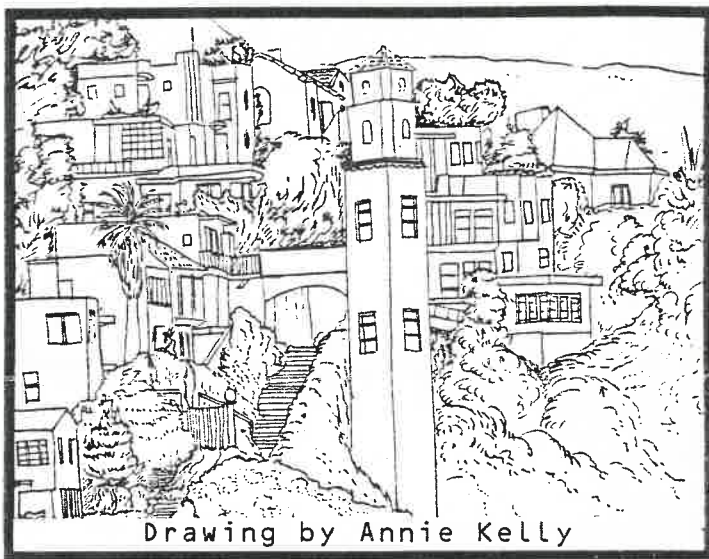
Membership in the Hollywood Heights Association is the best bargain in the hills.

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NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH BEING STARTED

The block captains met in November to discuss "Neighborhood Watch" and the importance of security. Sgt. Roger Dowis of HPD will be meeting with the block captains to inform them of crime prevention techniques which encompass home and car security as well as self protection. The crime rate increases sharply during the holiday season and Sgt. Dowis reminds us not to leave Christmas packages visible in our cars.

A citizens group north of Franklin Ave. has been extremely effective in reducing crime in their area, reported Sgt. Dowis. He said one of the reasons for their success was the high visibility of their patrol car and yellow jackets which read "Neighborhood Watch."

For Hollywood's population of 150,000, only 8 patrol cars are available to cover 318 street miles. One of the origins of the word "police" is the word polites, which means citizen. Sgt. Dowis feels very strongly that the citizens who make up a community definitely need to make an effort to keep their neighborhood as crime free as possible. It is OUR neighborhood and we should make it our responsibility to make it as livable as possible.

FREE HOME SECURITY PROGRAM

Hollywood is one of the areas where a cost-free security program has been made available for apartment and home dwellers living on a fixed or limited income. The program is funded by the City of Los Angeles, and it is for:

A single resident whose income is no higher than \$15,340 and a couple with an income no higher than \$17,400.

These services are available free: installation of deadbolts, window and patio locks, grab bars for bathroom safety, and peepholes. For further information, or to make an appointment, call 937-5855. (330 N. Fairfax Ave.).

This crime prevention, security and safety project is a non-sectarian program of Jewish Family Service of Los Angeles in conjunction with City Council members Finn, Wachs, Picus, Ferraro, Yaroslavsky, Russell, Bernardi, Cunningham, Braude, Bernson and Stevenson.

NEW COURTHOUSE IN HOLLYWOOD

An important step in fighting crime in Hollywood -- and improving an area which is one of the city's biggest tourist attractions -- has been taken by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors. In a 3-2 vote, the board agreed to build a courthouse in Hollywood, a project which has been sought for years by residents who believe that having judges in this area would help the battle against prostitution and its related crimes.

We applaud Supervisors Ed Edelman, Kenneth Hahn and Board Chairman Mike Antonovich, who voted to transfer three Municipal Court judges from downtown to the proposed new Hollywood courthouse. Nine possible sites are being considered for the courthouse, which should be open in mid-1985.

The two opponents of this much-needed project are Supervisors Deane Dana and Pete Schabarum, who apparently are neither concerned nor aware that Hollywood -- to which tourists come from all over the world -- is in the process of rejuvenation as a mecca for movie lovers everywhere. Hollywood is not just another neighborhood, gentlemen. It is Los Angeles history.

They voted no, even after Edelman pointed out that a courthouse in Hollywood is needed because cases involving Hollywood crime get lost among the judges downtown, and after Hahn noted that world visitors who want to walk along Hollywood Blvd. find they are in "almost a jungle."

The cost of the courthouse is estimated at \$600,000 to \$700,000 and will be paid for from a special courthouse construction fund obtained from court fines.
